

Public awaits Council invitation for submissions on Kāinga Ora development

Over the coming months, Auckland Council is expected to invite submissions on an application to build a 1300-home development on 80 hectares in Alfriston.

Windermere Holdings Ltd (WHL), in partnership with Kāinga Ora, has applied for a private plan change to rezone rural land which lies directly north of the Mill Road/Alfriston

The proposed development, known as the Alfriston Village Project, covers two adjacent land parcels (one owned by each organisation) on Mill Road.

Kāinga Ora describes the site as a 'hidden gem', and says that if the private plan change application is successful, the

land will be transformed into a "thriving urban village and future home to thousands of residents".

An application to rezone the land was submitted in November 2023.

Plans for the project, now publicly available at alfristonvillage. co.nz, show the site could eventually accommodate 1,300 new

Auckland's getting a Future **Fund**

As a businessman it is obvious to me that councils do not plan for financial ups and downs the same way the private sector does. Unfortunately, it's ratepayers who pay for it. We need steadier annual rates that are less shocking to household budgets.

And now we have a solution. Council's Governing Body gave the Auckland Future Fund the go-ahead last week [Thursday 16 May]. I'm not one for big celebrations, but I'm quietly chuffed about this one.

The Fund will be well capitalised with the airport shares alone, valued at around \$1.3 billion. It will now be established faster without the port lease, creating a potential windfall gain of around \$20 million next year. And this money will be channelled into a reserve fund to fix and finish community projects for legacy councils that didn't sell their airport shares before merging into a single Super City. So, everyone's happy.

And it gets better. Alongside the Auckland Future Fund getting the green light, the Port of Auckland has committed to contributing at least \$1.1 billion to Auckland Council over the next 10 years of this LTP. This figure is around \$172 million more than the projected net returns from investing the proceeds of the proposed port lease.

In the future, councillors can also consider other contributions to grow the fund, which could include returns from port operations if it makes financial sense to do so.

I'm glad that my councillors voted for logic in the end. Contrary to persisting myths, owning the AIAL shares did not give us any magical control over the operations of the airport, and it had such abysmal returns that it was costing Aucklanders to hold onto them. Based on independent advice, the Auckland Future Fund's cash contribution to Auckland Council is expected to be \$400 million more than its projected dividends from AIAL shares over the next 10 years.

This will be a 40 million dollar saving in rates each year.

Establishing the fund enables us to swap a single asset, the shares in the airport, for a diversified asset portfolio that can be expected to provide a higher and steadier rate of return, as well as being more resilient to shocks that impact the council's other assets.

It will be established as a trust. which can provide a very high level of protection against raids. We will also be seeking the added protection of legislation.

Times are tough for many people; I'm glad Auckland's future looks a little better with these deals across the line.

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
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\$52 per annum to be added to local area rates

Auckland Council has approved Franklin Local Board's pathways targeted rate in council's 10 year budget.

From 1 July this year, the \$52 a year targeted rate will be added to annual rates bills and will be used to fund paths and pedestrian safety improvements within the area.

The rate will increase each year in line with inflation and apply to all rateable properties in Franklin.

Franklin Local Board chair Angela Fulliames presented the proposal at council's Budget Committee on 16 May.

"Having begun this process in January 2023, checking in with communities across Franklin as we progressed, it is really pleasing to now know we can roll our sleeves up and start planning out the work programme. The board are very grateful to those community groups that helped make sure it was clear what was being asked of ratepayers, which helped the board to gain a good level of feedback.

"It is a sizable investment that our communities are committing to but they

- by Laura Kvigstad, Auckland believe in it because it is a direct benefit to our area," Angela said.

> Consultation for the rate received strong support from submitters. Those who did not support the initiative wanted the work to be funded through general rates instead.

> Mayor Wayne Brown commended the local board on their work.

> "Are you prepared to educate other local boards to do the same thing because this is commendable. As a country we have little pockets of innovation," Brown said.

> Franklin councillor Andy Baker said there was merit in local boards being able to set rates.

> "The local board and community have taken control rather than waiting for money to be handed to them," Baker said.

> Angela says that with Andy Baker's support, the board requested resolutions that will ensure regular visibility of revenue and expenditure, strong community participation, enabling partnerships and ensuring regular communications on the programme of trail projects.

> "This is very important to the board to have this clearly articulated as the people of Franklin have entrusted us to deliver."

high-quality proposal that offers enormous potential for the area as well as Auckland more broadly.


"The site is a 'hidden gem' within the Auckland area, in terms of its urban planning merits," he said.

"It stacks up economically, in terms of carbon footprint, and from a planning and infrastructure perspective as the most compelling greenfield site for urban development in the region.

"The site is extremely well located in Auckland, close to existing transport infrastructure. It doesn't require additional publicly funded infrastructure, and will help Auckland's urgent need for new housing."

If approved, the new village centre would include a supermarket, medical centre, and other local amenities.

Once accepted by Auckland Council, private plan change applications are usually published on their website, with further public consultation undertaken.



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Clevedon couple embark on spiritual odyssey in Spain

A Clevedon couple have spent the past few months "revving up" for their third adventure on the famous Camino de Santiago pilgrim route ending in Santiago de Campostela in Spain.

Presbyterian minister Mark Chapman and his wife, Heather, a veteran charity walker and tramper, together with fellow minister Bruce Graham, set out at the end of April on their 800km journey.

The ancient route leads through France over the Pyrenees and across Spain to the medieval city of Santiago de Campostela, believed to be the burial site of St James the brother of Jesus. Also known as "The Way of St James", it has been a pilgrimage trail for close to 1000 years.

The trio, whose trail name is "Two Revs and The Machine", say they make the pilgrimage for a number of reasons including the opportunity to get away from the busyness of life and to rediscover the spiritual element of their beings.

"People do the Camino for all sorts of reasons but it's hugely life changing and hugely rewarding," explains Heather. "For some, the Camino is life in microcosm. You travel the road with strangers on a road of self-discovery. You walk in their company, or alone. You listen to their stories of joy or heartbreak."

Says Mark: "If you ask people on the road they will tell you they walk to 'find' God, to reconnect with life, perhaps in

memory of someone who has died. Many have no answers, simply that the Camino calls them. Very often it is not until they are on the road that they discover why they are walking."

This year the friends will walk as Camino Angels - people who, having previously walked the Camino, feel called to return, to assist others on the road.

"We will carry extra bandages, liniments and other first aid items to allow us to minister to any we come across who are struggling," says Mark. "We will be encouragers on the way, maybe providing a meal for someone; praying with someone; supporting them on their journey and listening to them."

The grandparents of 11 first hiked the pilgrim route in 2017, when Mark stepped down after 40 years as minister of the Clevedon Presbyterian Church.

In 2019, after celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary, the couple returned to walk the Portuguese Camino – a 350km coastal trail from Porto in Portugal, again leading to Santiago.

Their fellow traveller, Rev Bruce Graham, minister at St Aidans Presbyterian Church in Takanini, is also no stranger to the route, having walked the Camino two and a half times.

Averaging 25 to 30kms a day over all sorts of terrain, the trail is both physically and mentally demanding.

"We have been training for six months," says Heather, who tramps weekly with the Manukau Tramping Club. "The three of us often walk from Maraetai to Pine Harbour and back as well as training on the roads and hills around Clevedon, while Bruce has also been doing plenty of training walks in the botanical gardens, near where he lives."

The intrepid travellers will be away for eight weeks. They will be joined on the last 100kms of their journey to Santiago by Heather's and Mark's two grandsons, Liam and Tate, currently living in London.

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Hearing panel approves Clevedon Quarry re-zoning plan

Stevenson Aggregates Limited (SAL) has succeeded with its application to rezone land at its quarry on McNicol Road, Clevedon.

A panel of three independent hearing commissioners stamped their approval on Private Plan Change 89, which sought to rezone land owned by the quarry. Thirty one hectares, which was previously designated a Special Purpose Quarry Zone, will be rezoned to Rural Production Zoned land, while a further 31 hectares of previously-designated Rural Production Zoned land will be rezoned as Special Purpose Quarry Zone.

The re-zoning of land essentially represents a 'zone swap', to enable future expansion of the quarry to the south rather than the north, to avoid a Significant Ecological Area and a NSMA.

A large number of local residents, including the Clevedon Protection Society and the Clevedon Community and Business Association, opposed the plan change application, with the main argument centring on the possibility that the zone change could allow SAL to quarry a larger area, thus extending the quarry's lifespan and increasing the movements of heavy vehicles on local roads which are already under strain. The previous zoning meant that the available area of land which could be quarried was

limited by the presence of a Significant Ecological Area (SEA). By swapping the zones, the quarry can now extract aggregate from an area not subject to any SEA environmental constraints, which residents argue increases the area that may be quarried.

However the independent hearing panel said it was satisfied that approval of PC89 would not result in any significant increase in the area that can potentially be quarried, saying: "By accepting that PC89 effectively swaps one area of SPQZ with another of the same size, many of the potential effects will not be appreciably different to those that are enabled currently. Most notably, we anticipate that the number and frequency of heavy truck movements on the surrounding road network will remain similar to those occurring at present."

As with the recent Plan Change 88 hearing for Beachlands South, the commissioners dismissed many residents concerns on the understanding that these concerns would be managed via the resource consenting process, which can only take place following the plan change.

In its decision, the panel said: "As a result, we have accepted that some of the consideration of effects is at a relatively

general level and more detailed assessment would be undertaken at a future time. Our task on a plan change of CPS have considered the cost and risk

this nature is to get to a point where we are satisfied that effects could be addressed."

The Clevedon Protection Society (CPS) opposed PC89, and is disappointed with the result. In a statement issued to the PC Times this week, the society said:

"CPS is disappointed that the Independent Hearing Commissioners for Auckland Council have approved PC89. CPS argued strongly that the proposed land swap will enable an increase in the area that can be quarried. Whilst the Independent Hearing Commissioners acknowledged this fact, they have chosen to "accept the Applicant's rationale for PC89 at face value". SAL owns approximately 400 hectares of land to the south of the existing quarry. CPS remains concerned that SAL will seek to further expand the quarry to the south in the future beyond what PC89 will permit. The planning commissioners largely rejected all the concerns raised by submitters, including CPS, stating that these matters would need to be addressed as part of any future Resource Consent. This includes serious concerns raised regarding stormwater and erosion control, road safety and maintenance, and noise. CPS is disappointed that once again the community's concerns have largely been ignored. Despite all of this, CPS have decided not to appeal the PC89 decision.



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
